3. We believe:

Fathers play important roles in the lives of their children. According to research, there is a direct link between positive father involvement and child well-being. This partnership will provide an efficient, effective, and innovative approach to addressing the fatherless home, eliminate barriers between fathers and children, and support fathers with comprehensive wraparound services. This partnership will increase the capacity of the Fairfax DFS-CYF Division to serve and support fathers and their families. The additional partnership with Dr. Cabrera, University of Maryland, and Dr. Fagan, Temple University will provide research and evaluation of the long-term effectiveness of the Fathers-in-Touch fatherhood program; a critical analysis that is needed to ensure that the program is indeed having a positive and measurable impact on participating members.

4. Background:

CYEP has the full capacity to fund and provide a high quality parenting class for men entitled Fathers-in-Touch, and is excited and eager to expand the Fathers-in-Touch program to more areas in Northern Virginia (most specifically Fairfax County) in an effort to reach as many local fathers as possible who will benefit from this much-needed service.

5. Together we will:

CYEP will provide three fatherhood classes per year to fathers in Fairfax County, using the evidence-based 24/7 Dad Curriculum developed by the National Fatherhood Initiative. Fathers in Touch will provide comprehensive wrap around services and support, 24/7 Dad Parenting class, and monthly activities for fathers and their families in Fairfax County. All of these services will be guided by rigorous, evidenced based academic research to provide a high quality program with a measureable impact on the lives of children and families in Fairfax County. CYEP will also provide evaluation thru a contract with the University of Maryland, Dr. Natasha Cabrera.

DFS-CYF will provide referrals to the program, marketing and technical assistance to support the program.

7. Where:

All 24/7 Dad parenting classes will be held at sites agreed upon by Fairfax County DFS-CYF and CYEP in Fairfax County starting in January 2010. In the first year, the three DFS-CYF regions with the highest demand will be served. Upon renewal of the partnership in Dec 2010, the fourth region will be considered first.

Child care for the 24/7 classes will be provided on site by CYEP.

The supervised father/child visitation activities will be held at sites to be determined by CYEP once per month.

During the course of the program, CYEP will offer the fathers access to substance abuse and mental health pre-screenings as part of the class. If a participant whose family/children are receiving services from DFS-CYF self-reports substance abuse or mental health issues, CYEP will, in consultation with the participant, refer this to DFS-CYF. In cases where the participant self-referred into the fatherhood class, DFS will consult with and educate CYEP staff on the referral process and provide information about mental health and ADS programs available to Fairfax County residents.

Research and evaluation will be conducted at the Fathers-in-Touch parenting classes and monthly activities.

8. How:

The first of the three classes held in Fairfax County will be offered in mid January 2010. Subsequent classes will begin in early May and September 2010. The classes will follow a classroom and group discussion format and will incorporate monthly supervised father-child activities. Interactions between children and their fathers will be monitored by trained CYEP staff who have completed and passed criminal and Child Protective Services background checks. All interactions between children in foster care or in protective supervision and their fathers will be documented in writing. Information about

County programs and resource information will be made available to the fathers through guest presentations and educational materials.

Each 12 week parenting class (10 to 12 dads) will begin at 6:30pm and will end at 9pm on Tuesdays and Wednesday evenings. Dinner will be served from 6:30pm to 7pm. Guest speakers and presentations will occur from 6:30pm to 7pm. Two facilitators will cofacilitate the classes.

Activities will be held once per month at designated sites for fathers enrolled in the class and graduates of the class.

9. Target audience:

Fathers who reside in Fairfax County or have children receiving DFS-CYF services are eligible to attend the class. The classes are funded by CYEP and are free of charge to fathers regardless of income. Fathers struggling with alcohol abuse, drugs or mental health issues will be referred to appropriate services and will need to be active and compliant with needed treatment prior to admission in the class.

10. Each partner agrees to provide:

(Also see attached chart with time lines and more specific details) Capital Youth Empowerment Program will:

- provide at least (3) 12 week parenting class for fathers, facilitators, and dinner at each class ¾ of each year; at least 2 classes if demand/recruitment is low.
 Classes will not exceed 12 men per class. CYEP will also conduct pre and post inventories.
- provide supervised visitation activities once per month. The dads from classes will
 meet at the monthly activity. All dads participating in the monthly activity will be
 registered in a 24/7 Dad class or a graduate.
- conduct Fatherhood symposiums and panel presentations for parent support groups in Fairfax County to educate mothers on the important role a father plays in the life of his child.
- provide brochures and flyers for Fathers in Touch that incorporate the County seal and are approved by DFS.
- contract with the University of Maryland Evaluation proposal through existing funds.
- work with the DC Central Kitchen to provide meals for classes.

Fairfax Department of Family Services-CYF will:

- provide information about services available to fathers in Fairfax County (e.g., Mental Health services, Alcohol and Drug Services)
- refer men to the 24/7 Dad Parenting class.

- secure Fairfax County sites for the class and print flyers to promote attendance to the class.
- coordinate with CYEP to provide guest speakers to address child support (DCSE), domestic abuse, and employment resources for the class (Joblink) for 30 minutes presentations during the dinner portion of 3 different classes of the 12 week 24/7 dad parenting class.
- help identify child care volunteers for the 24/7 Dad parenting classes.
- provide consulting on program development.
- Work with CYEP to identify a group of non-participating fathers to participate in pre and post surveys which will serve as the control group for the evaluation without delaying delivery of needed services to these fathers.

Researchers, Dr. Cabrera, University of MD and Dr. Fagan, Temple University, will:

- create and conduct research tools to measure the success of Fathers in Touch, including follow up studies on the outcomes and results.
- provide reports and evaluations on a quarterly basis. They will make all evaluations available to both CYEP and Fairfax County DFS. A yearly report will be produced for Fairfax County Office of Public Private Partnerships.

The outcomes will be measured through both qualitative and quantitative methods. Dr. Cabrera and Dr. Fagan will: 1). track the number of men graduating from the 24/7 Dad parenting class as well as the number of men registered for the Fathers in Touch program; 2). record the number of contacts made between fathers and their children through the supervised monthly activities; 3). tally the number of men screened for substance abuse and mental health services; 4). calculate the number of fatherhood symposiums at local parenting classes; and 5). ascertain the positive change in attitude concerning fatherhood measured by the Fathers in Touch pre and post survey instruments, in addition to, focus groups and intensive interviewing sessions wherein CYEP will gauge the direct impact and well-being of this intervention in the lives of the children and families we serve.

11. We know we will be successful if we:

- a. Increase in the number of Fairfax fathers graduating (maintained at least 80% attendance or attended at least 24 of the 30 total class hours) from fatherhood classes from an estimated 8 fathers per year to 24 fathers in the first year of the partnership. Targets for subsequent years to be determined at date of agreement renewal.
- b. Increase in fathering and parenting knowledge of fathers in the FIT fatherhood class by an average of 10% (individual score) and 15% (group score) in scientific measurement tools.
- c. Increase in positive involvement of fathers with their children measured by the number of Fairfax fathers in FIT taking advantage of 1 out of 3 of the monthly supervised visitation activities with their children, and the number of fathers in FIT who maintain at

least monthly face to face contacts with their children for at least 12 months after graduation.

- d. Maintain percentage participation of CYF clients compared to external clients at 75% (18 of 24) vs. 25%.
- e. FIT conducts at least 3 forums at local parent support groups

12. We agree to the following renewal process:

- a. Begin the renewal process in September 2010.
- b. Joint review of the outcomes outlined above.
- c. Decide whether to continue the partnership.
- d. Discuss and review any proposed changes or modifications to the agreement.
- e. Finalize new agreement no later than October 31, 2010.

13. Other Resources

The Office of Public Private Partnerships will serve as liaison to facilitate effective and productive partnership by identifying issues collectively with partners; understanding the vision of individual partners to meet a particular community issue; using experience, best practices and strategic planning to guide and lead the partners toward a common goal.

The Office of Public Private Partnerships will assist CYEP in providing referrals to nonprofit capacity building organizations for the purpose of sustainability.

The Office of Public Private Partnerships will support the initiative by communicating Fathers in Touch to potential funders.

OAR will provide 1 thirty minute information session per 12 week class about their services and employment. They will also take referrals from the class as we are assisting men to gain employment to support their families.

14. Future opportunities

Green DMV can help to provide job training for fathers.
